 B: I'm so excited! Are they my keys?
 A: Yes, they're Mr and Mrs Brown's old keys and now they're your keys.

Presentation

Use possessive 's and possessive adjectives to talk about objects, people and places.

Possessive 's

- Add 's to singular noun: *My sister's keys.*
 - Add ' to a plural noun: *My sisters' house.*
- It's Karen's phone. Emily is my brother's friend.*

TIP 's is also the contracted form of is: *It's = It is: It's my parents' house.*

Possessive adjectives

Subject pronoun	Possessive adjective	
I	my	It's my laptop.
you	your	Where's your passport?
he	his	His parents are Italian.
she	her	Her father's from Argentina.
it	its	Venice is famous for its canals.
we	our	Our car is a BMW.
they	their	Their daughter's a doctor.

A possessive adjective has one form for singular and plural: *his phone, his parents.*

Key vocabulary **Everyday objects:** credit card, glasses, keys, laptop, passport, ticket
People in your life: mother, father, parents, son, daughter, children, husband, wife, brother, sister
