





The Amazon rain forest is the largest rain forest in

the world. More than half of all the rain forests left on Earth are there. The area covers about two thirds of the South American continent. It covers parts of nine different countries, including Brazil, Colombia, and Peru. This big forest makes up to 20% of the world's oxygen for us to breathe.

An adult jaguar can weigh more than 140 kilograms (300 pounds) and grow to more than two meters (eight fee) long from nose to tail, in most countries in the Amazon, the law says you cannot hunt jaguars. But some people still do, so the jaguars are still in trouble.



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


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
