Use intensifying adverbs before adjectives to make them stronger.

*It's **very** cold. / It's **absolutely** freezing!*

The choice of intensifying adverb depends on whether the adjective is gradable or ungradable, and some adverbs can be used with either:

Gradable	Ungradable	Gradable and ungradable
<i>extremely, fairly, rather, very, pretty, a bit, incredibly</i>	<i>absolutely, completely, totally, utterly</i>	<i>quite, really</i>

### adverb + gradable adjective

Most adjectives, e.g. *cold, surprising*, are gradable. This means we can make them stronger or weaker with adverbs like *very, a bit, incredibly, really* or *extremely*.

*I'm **a bit** / **very** / **extremely** cold.*

*Your house is **incredibly** small.*

### adverb + ungradable adjective

Other adjectives, e.g. *freezing, amazing* and *essential* are ungradable. We cannot make them stronger or weaker in this way. Ungradable adjectives already contain the idea of 'very' in their meaning. We use *absolutely, really* and *utterly* for emphasis with ungradable adjectives.

*It's **very** cold today. = It's **freezing** today. (freezing = very cold)*

### adverb + absolute adjective

Ungradable adjectives can also be 'absolute' adjectives. Adjectives like this do not have a comparative or superlative form, e.g. *right, wrong, unique* and *true*. With absolute adjectives, we use the intensifying adverbs *completely, entirely* and *totally*.

*I disagree! You are **totally** wrong!*

### quite + ungradable adjectives

We can use the adverb *quite* with ungradable adjectives, including absolute adjectives. When we do this, the meaning is 'very'.

*It's **quite** cold today, don't you think? (quite = a bit)*

*I think this landscape is **quite** incredible. (quite = really)*

**TIP** Often, the choice of adverb and adjective combination is a question of collocation. For example, we prefer to say *absolutely freezing* rather than *utterly freezing*, even though both are grammatically correct. There are also some exceptions, for example, we sometimes say *very/ really different* (even though *different* is an absolute adjective).
